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LATEST NEWS

- Hong Kong protests that were sparked two months ago moved from city streets to Hong Kong International Airport/HKG earlier this week, delaying, then shutting down all flights. As of Wednesday August 14, flights were operating, with tighter check-in procedures in place. Passports and travel documents are closely scrutinized before passengers are allowed access to departure halls. Read the U.S. Hong Kong Travel Advisory here.
- There are new U.S. passport photo rules. Check them out <u>here</u>.
- Global grounding of the Boeing 737 MAX continues. Speculation on lifting the ban ranges from "sometime in the fourth quarter" to "not until early next year." A number of carriers have cut back on flights to compensate for lowered capacity. Southwest is pulling it flights out of Newark to redeploy the aircraft in other markets, including more lucrative Hawaii.
- National weather service **NOAA** is now expecting **10-17** named storms this summer (winds of 39 mph or greater), with 5 to 9 of them becoming hurricanes (winds of 74 mph or greater), including 2 to 4 major hurricanes (winds of 111 mph or greater). This updated outlook is for the entire six-month hurricane season, which ends November 30.
- The U.S. Department of Transportation (DOT) has released its final statement on its enforcement priorities regarding service animals on flights, following a couple of years in which airlines have updated their policies on emotional support and service animals following a series of high-profile, in-flight incidents. The statement provides guidance about the DOT's interpretation and enforcement of the existing service animal rules. The support and service animal policies for the "big three" airlines, all of whom have issued updates over the past few years, are available here: American Airlines; Delta; United Airlines. - In Europe, Ireland's low-cost carrier Ryanair pilots are planning to strike for 48 hours, starting on August 22, and again on September 2 until September 4 unless talks between the airline and the union are successful in resolving issues. The strike dates were announced after the British Airline Pilots' Association/BALPA said 80 percent of those who voted in a ballot were in favor of industrial action, based on a turnout of 72%.

AIRLINE UPDATES

ALASKA AIRLINES

• The Alaska Airlines Mileage Plan already has 17 partners, part of Alaska's "Switzerland strategy" of aligning with airlines, not airline alliances. It added Aer Lingus as a code-share partner last year and now it also allows award redemptions on the Dublin-based carrier. Effective immediately, coach awards on Aer Lingus start at 30,000 miles each way. Business class awards start at 60,000 miles each way. Intra-Europe coach travel on Aer Lingus starts at 8,000 miles. Complete details are here. Aer Lingus last year launched service to Alaska Air's Sea-Tac hub.

AMERICAN AIRLINES

- American Airlines has raised its trans-Atlantic capacity by 5.2 percent after drastically reducing
 underutilized routes to Latin American and Asia. The carrier has debuted summer-season service
 from various U.S. cities to Berlin, Italy, Croatia, London, Athens and more, and it will start five
 trans-Atlantic routes next summer. Ask your Burkhalter agent for details.
- American Airlines says it's dropping service to Bolivia, joining several other international carriers
 that have recently left. The airline says the three daily flights to Miami will halt on November 27.
 Airline spokesperson Luren Ruotolo says the step was taken for commercial reasons, to assure
 the company's routes are profitable in a competitive market. Most visitors arriving by air now
 must transfer in Lima, Peru.
- American is launching flights to Africa for the first time. The airline, which made the
 announcement as part of the release of its summer 2020 international schedule, will begin
 operating flights from Philadelphia to Casablanca, Morocco, starting June 4, 2020. The new
 Morocco flight will mark the airline's first entrance into Africa, and it will make it the only U.S.
 carrier with nonstop service to Casablanca, American said. The flight will be operated three times
 per week on a Boeing 757.
- American Airlines has expanded its Five Star Service to four additional airports. The new service began August 1 at Austin-Bergstrom International Airport/AUS in Texas, Nashville International Airport/BNA in Tennessee and Newark Liberty International Airport/EWR in New Jersey, followed by a recent rollout at Atlanta's Hartsfield-Jackson International Airport/ATL. The service is a personalized airport experience available to customers traveling in a premium cabin that offers priority check-in, expedited security screening, access to the Admirals Club, an escort to their gate and other customizable experiences tailored to their interests.

DELTA AIR LINES

- Delta Air Lines has received final federal approval to launch <u>flights from Atlanta to Tokyo's</u>
 <u>Haneda Airport</u>, which will replace its service to Tokyo Narita. The new Atlanta-Haneda flights will launch in March 2020, the start of Delta's summer schedule, on Boeing 777-200ER jets.
- Delta Air Lines is set to get the green light for an upgraded three-way transatlantic joint venture
 with Air France-KLM and Virgin Atlantic. U.S. transportation secretary Elaine Chao gave
 tentative approval to the new joint venture which would replace two previous separate
 agreements with Air France-KLM and with Virgin. The airlines say the joint business arrangement
 will offer 'the most comprehensive route network, convenient flight schedules, competitive fares
 and reciprocal frequent flyer benefits.'
- In onboard entertainment news, Delta announced plans to add a number of **Hulu** shows to its offerings, including **The Handmaid's Tale**, **The Act** and the **Fyre Fraud** documentary. The airline reports it also recently equipped its 700th aircraft with in-flight entertainment screens.
- Flying with a bike just got a lot less expensive for Delta Airlines travelers. The company announced that they have eliminated additional fees for bikes, as well as all oversized sports gear. "Delta customers traveling with surfboards, bicycles, golf clubs, scuba gear and other large-sized sporting equipment will now be allowed to check them as part of their standard baggage allowance." The airline eliminated the \$150 specialty sports bag fee previously charged for these items, effective for travel worldwide on tickets purchased beginning July 17, 2019. Travelers will instead pay a first, second or third checked bag fee according to the fare rules associated with their booking and/or SkyMiles Medallion status.

SOUTHWEST AIRLINES

- Southwest Airlines said it will **exit the Newark Airport market in November**. Lacking planes because of the prolonged Boeing 737 MAX grounding, Southwest said it is ceasing service from weak-performing Newark Liberty International airport, where it had up to 20 daily departures, to consolidate its New York City service at nearby LaGuardia and focus growth on Hawaii. The airline says it's not abandoning the New York Metro area, however, and will continue to fly to LaGuardia and Islip, a regional Long Island airport east of Kennedy.
- Southwest is set to further expand its service to Hawaii. The airline will "provide details of the
 next phases of Hawaii flying in the coming weeks and months, as we put new flights out for sale,"
 said Gary Kelly, board chairman and chief executive officer.
- Southwest Airlines offered a new Human trafficking awareness curriculum for employees, stating statistics suggest that a large percentage of victims are transported via airplane during some portion of their experience. Tips on how to identify Human Trafficking, and suggested actions that should be taken, if necessary, are part of the training.

UNITED AIRLINES

- United Airlines has canceled its first route as a result of the ongoing grounding of Boeing's 737
 MAX. The carrier's said its daily service from Chicago to Leon, Mexico will be suspended beginning September 2019. United has 14 of the aircraft in its fleet.
- **To increase capacity**, United is adding 19 used Boeing 737-700 aircraft. They plan to take delivery in December.
- United Airlines is increasing the number of Polaris seats available on flights between Newark
 Liberty International Airport and London's Heathrow Airport, and it expects to offer at least five
 daily nonstop flights with the premium seats by September.
- United is testing a service that will allow domestic first-class passengers to pre-order inflight
 meals. Passengers who are selected to participate in the test will receive emails directing them
 to a website where they can select meals five days and up to 24 hours before their flights.
- A luxury **United Club recently opened in Raleigh-Durham International Airport**, offering area favorites like biscuits and Carolina-style barbecue. The luxury club is the first new location in more than 15 years.
- United is making good on its promise to help travelers with tough flight connections by further
 expanding its ConnectionSaver Tool to even more airports around the country. Available through
 the United Airlines smartphone app, ConnectionSaver sends users personalized text messages
 with directions to the gate for their connecting flight, information about expected travel time
 between the two gates, nearby amenities, and will even hold the flight for a few minutes for
 members who need a little extra time.

INTERNATIONAL AIRLINES

- Air France will introduce RFID bag tracking technology at Paris-Charles de Gaulle airport
 beginning in 2020 to improve efficiency and give passengers more information about their
 luggage. The French carrier has struck a deal with Paris Aeroport to introduce tags equipped with
 radio frequency identification (RFID) chips to about 8 million pieces of baggage a year. The airline
 says the technology will gradually be deployed to its other airports. In addition to addressing the
 growing demand by passengers to know where their bags are, the companies say the tags will
 improve baggage identification and tracking.
- Hong Kong Airlines will suspend flights between its Hong Kong hub and San Francisco/SFO after
 October 4, 2019. For the last year and a half, the carrier brought fresh competition to the busy
 SFO-HKG route, and fares dropped precipitously. With it ending, travelers could see airfares
 between SFO and Hong Kong increase from record lows.

- Qantas is launching new flights that will help travelers significantly cut down their travel time between the U.S. and Australia. The Australian carrier has begun ticket sales for new nonstop routes to Brisbane from Chicago and San Francisco. The listed flight time for the Chicago to Brisbane flight is 17 hours, 20 minutes, compared to the current 20-hour-plus routes with stops. The new schedule is set to launch February 9, 2020, under the flight numbers QF85/86. Ask your Burkhalter agent for details
- Lufthansa will split its A380 fleet evenly between Munich and Frankfurt beginning the summer
 of 2020, operating the superjumbo from the Bavarian city to two new destinations. The addition
 of two A380s will increase the fleet based in Munich to seven, matching the seven Lufthansa
 superjumbos based in Frankfurt. The new A380 routes include Boston and San Francisco yearround.
- British Airways has begun adding schedules that include flights with its new business class.
 Newark flights get the new cabin beginning January 21; Chicago launches a week later and Boston a week after that. Seattle schedules start in January, then Philadelphia in March.
- Beginning May 4, 2020, Lufthansa will launch five weekly flights between Munich and Detroit that will complement Lufthansa's existing Frankfurt to Detroit flight. The flights will operate on Mondays, Wednesdays, Thursdays, Fridays, and Saturdays.
- Cathay Pacific records passengers via closed-circuit video surveillance on aircraft and in its airport lounges. The Hong Kong-based carrier revealed the existence of the cameras in its customer privacy policy, which it updated online on July 23. In a statement, Cathay spokeswoman Julie Jarratt said the cameras are used to protect customers and frontline staff. On aircraft, the lone camera is positioned near the cockpit door for security purposes.
- **Air Italy** has signed Special Prorate Agreements with Finnair and El Al. The interline agreements enable passengers to buy tickets across multiple legs on both carriers.
- Mexican low-cost carrier Interjet has joined TSA's Pre-Check program.
- **Air France** plans to operate 11 weekly flights from **Washington/Dulles** to **Paris/CDG** –an increase from the current seven--beginning on October 28.

AIRPORT NEWS

Chicago's Midway International ranks as the country's worst airport, and San Diego International
Airport is the best, according to a recent study. Airports in Phoenix; Portland, Ore.; Atlanta and
Sacramento also rated high, while Detroit and Orlando, Fort Lauderdale and the Southwest
Florida airports slipped toward the bottom of the list.

- For several years in the Burkhalter Travel News we've shared updates of construction "progress" at the Berlin Brandenburg Airport, a saga that began in June 2012 when the thennew facility was weeks away from opening. That's when German authorities found fault with the fire-suppression systems. Then another problem and another and another. Seven years later, the airport opening is still at least a year away and the BBC reports that there were actually 550,000 faults turned up by various regulatory bodies. The latest update reveals that the airport, which now has a second terminal too, will open "on schedule" in October, 2020.
- Airports never seem to run out of lines. Security lines, restrooms lines, and even quick-service
 restaurants can have anxiety-inducing waits. One Houston company is working to make that
 sandwich a true grab-and-go experience. The **Grab app** (available on Google Play and the App
 Store) allows travelers to pre-order their food, and it recently raised a multi-million-dollar
 fundraising round to expand into additional airports. www.getgrab.com
- Austin-Bergstrom International Airport/AUS in Austin, Texas, is in the public testing phase of an
 autonomous transportation technology pilot. The airport's Easy Mile EZ10 driverless shuttle is
 available to transport passengers going between the Barbara Jordan Terminal and the rental car
 facility/ground transportation area. Operating on the upper level of Garage 1, the electric,
 driverless and ADA-compliant vehicle represents another mobility alternative for transporting
 travelers on the airport's campus.
- A \$1 billion project is adding a terminal with restaurants and 14 gates at Ronald Reagan
 Washington National Airport in Arlington, Va. Domes will serve as skylights, and extensive glass will offer views of Washington, D.C.
- American Express has rolled out mobile check-in for Centurion lounges. Platinum and Centurion card members can begin the check-in process up to 30 minutes prior to lounge arrival using the "Find a Lounge" tool in the American Express app. Card members still have to stand in line to show their photo ID and boarding pass at the desk when they arrive, so there are mixed thoughts about whether this new check-in option is really a time-saver.
- Tennessee's Nashville International Airport is in the midst of a major project to improve facilities
 and better serve travelers. In addition to a recently completed parking garage, the airport is
 adding a new ticketing counter and pedestrian plaza and also expanding the baggage claim area
 and Concourse D.
- Here's useful airport information for American and Delta travelers: You'll find American Airlines

- San Francisco International Airport will become the first airport in the U.S. to ban plastic, single-use water bottles starting on Aug. 20 when restaurants, cafes, and vending machines will become water-bottle free zones.

HOTEL UPDATES

- Marriott International is launching airport hotel shuttle tracking through its app. Already in use
 at 15 hotels at four airports, with 200 hotels planned by the end of the year, travelers can watch
 a van icon move along its route and get an estimated arrival time at your stop, just like waiting
 for your Uber, Lyft or package delivery.
- The **Saint Kate Hotel** in **downtown Milwaukee** is carrying out its mission to serve as an art center and not just an art-friendly lodging site. Art-themed guest rooms, a drama theater, lectures, classes and an artist-in-residence studio are among the features of the 219-room property, which houses a satellite program of the Museum of Wisconsin Art.
- DoubleTree by Hilton's newest hotel is now open for business in Chandler, Arizona after the
 160-room property underwent a comprehensive refurbishment program. Before Hilton stepped
 in, the hotel was independently operated under the name Chandler Southgate Hotel. The
 DoubleTree brand now has 10 other locations in Arizona spread throughout Flagstaff, Phoenix
 and Tucson.
- Another new brand is in the works at Hilton. No name has been disclosed but it will fit in the
 upscale segment and target urban markets. It's described as "a notch above Hilton Garden Inn
 for a more urban, mixed-use, higher-end development opportunity," according to the CEO who
 sees potential for 'hundreds' of locations globally.
- In-room fitness amenities ranging from exercise equipment to healthy snacks and meditation headbands are getting a workout from hotel operators in response to guests' desires and willingness to pay. A leading example is equipment-stocked Five Feet to Fitness rooms, launched by Hilton Hotels in recent years and carrying a \$45 surcharge.
- A hotel near Seattle has taken the room-service robot trend to a serious level, employing a
 machine named Hazel to deliver marriage proposals with engagement rings. The Hotel
 Interurban in Tukwila, WA adds a one-night stay, a bottle of champagne and a \$100 dining
 credit.
- Marriott's invitation-only elite tier is in the process of rolling out throughout the Marriott system. They say Marriott Cobalt Elite status is available exclusively through Marriott's CEO. (Marriott employees can allegedly nominate members, though they have to be approved by the CEO). Look for more details here.
- The **Raffles Singapore** has reopened following an extensive, multiyear revitalization project. Restoration of the luxury property, opened as the first Raffles hotel back in 1887, began in February 2017. And yes, they still serve the Singapore Sling.

Sleepbox is a new micro-hotel concept, recently opened at Washington Dulles with plans to expand to more airports soon. Travelers can rent a room either hourly or overnight. Sleepbox is located airside in Concourse A, near gate A15. It's open 24/7. Priority Pass members receive a complimentary room for a one hour stay. If members want to spend more time there, they can add an extra hour at the rate of \$24.

TOOLS, TIPS AND TECHNOLOGY

- United is taking an equity stake in Clear, a technology company that uses fingerprints and iris scans to verify a traveler's identity at security check points. United's investment will help Clear expand into some of the airline's largest hubs. Initial launches are slated for Newark Liberty International and Bush International in Houston. The company is also seeking approval to open lanes at O'Hare International.
- Amtrak plans to add a nonstop Acela weekday train between New York Pennsylvania Station
 and Washington Union Station. The once-daily roundtrips will be in addition to existing Acela
 trains that make other stops in the Northeast Corridor. The nonstop is due to launch on
 September 23 and make the New York-Washington run in about 2.5 hours, about 15 minutes
 faster than stopping trains.
- What's open, what's closed on Labor Day? Read this
- Even seasoned road warriors can **learn more about becoming a better world traveler**. There are plenty of sites and travel tools out there telling you what to do in a new destination. But what about what *NOT* to do? Dondoo is a first-of-its-kind search engine for travelers who want to avoid travel *faux pas*. The site is organized by region, country, state, city, and even airport. To find your destination of interest/concern, you can either search for it or scroll the interactive map. - Google Lens, an image recognition technology which enables you to "search what you see," is essentially a way for users to point their phone at anything that catches their attention and look it up on Google. With five functions (Auto, Translate, Text, Shopping, and Dining) Lens is a useful and convenient tool. Android phone users can download the Google Lens app from the Google Play Store. iPhone users can find Lens in the Google app for iOS.
- What are your options when a TSA agent says "NO way!" to something you'd planned on taking
 onboard? A company called Airport Mailers located at several airports can help you mail
